FOREWARD

This collection of Knoxville Journal (TN) articles was begun in February 2020 for the purpose of making historical information available for the 90th Anniversary Celebration of North Knoxville Baptist Church in Knoxville, TN. The Celebration was scheduled for March 29, 2000, but was cancelled because of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The church was founded January 19, 1930.

This is a fairly complete set of articles published from 1930 through 1964 in the Knoxviile Journal about North Knoxville Baptist Church. A few articles were omitted because they had no useful information concerning the history of the church. The search engine failed to find all files pertaining to the church, but no doubt it found the vast majority of them. All images were obtained by copying articles from a personal subscription of Newspapers by Ancestry. com. Some of the images, particularly photos, did not reproduce well when they were digitized for the website.

Some articles were modified by piecing them back together in a more readable format to fit the layout of the articles. Type sizes varied as well as sometimes being spread over several columns or pages, and photos were separated from articles. Also, a few of the referenced page numbers shown are sometimes off by one or two pages.

Attendance grew rapidly, and an increase in membership necessitated a larger building. The present building was built in 1932 on Oldham Avenue at Worth Street. The Rev. Jimmy Day was chosen first pastor. The new building for some time had a sawdust floor and was comprised of a large auditorium. Membership again began to increase and more room was required. A four-room house behind the church was recently purchased and four Sunday school classes now meet in it.

The building, which now has 13 rooms, provides a meeting place for different departments of the

Women's Missionary Union, and Sunday school classes.

But membership of the church has again increased. Plans for a new building started six years ago. At least \$500 had been set aside in 1944, one month before Mr. Wolfenbarger accepted the pastorate on Easter Sunday, Approximately \$14,000 has been solicited and plans for the new building are near completion.

A Boy Scout troop performs regular duties for the church as well as for the community. Organized two years ago through the efforts of Tom Cinnamon, a church member, the unit has more than 30 members. Clarence Riggs is scoutmaster.

The church's twc-week Vacation Bible School now in progress will close next Friday, commencement exercises to be held July 2 at the church. Mr. Wolfenbarger is principal of the school.

Since Mr. Wolfenbarger assumed duties as pastor of the church, the Sunday School membership has more than doubled, and the church enrollment has increased by 276 members. Present membership is 750.

The church recently purchased a parsonage at 234 Emerald Avenue for \$7350 and also bought a piece of property adjoining the sanctuary.

Mrs. B. M. Beeler's Sunday school class, consisting of mothers, has been recognized by the church for having the largest attendance record every Sunday this year in the church.

The first unit, to be built adjacent to the present church building, will cost an estimated \$75,000. Services will be held in the old building while construction of the new unit is underway, Mr. Wolfenbarger explained.

"Mr. Spears' enthusiasm and efforts was a great inspiration to other members of the church," Mr. Wolfenbarger declared.

Spears' only comment was: "Pennies make dollars."

The church, its membership rising to 802, recently started its campaign to raise funds for a new building.

It was founded Jan. 19, 1930, in a home on Worth Street and soon moved into a one-room store building on Worth Street at Emerald Avenue with seven members.

Attendance grew rapidly and soon the church moved to its present location on Oldham Avenue at Worth Street.

The new church will be built of brick and will include departments for all ages in its Sunday School, Mr. Wolfenbarger. A parsonage was recently purchased at 234 Emerald Avenue for \$7350.

> A steeple also is to be installed on the new church.

"It was 'quite a big night for me," stated Rev. Wolfenbarger. "It brought back a lot of very pleasant memories."




